**INTRODUCTION**: There are good churches, there are bad churches, and there are churches that fall in between. If being engaged in a local church isn't optional for Christ followers, then the big question that looms is which church one should engage with. There are many ways to answer this question, but in today's content we concentrated on how good churches think about sin and respond to those who sin in much the same way that Jesus did. Bad churches, on the other hand, tend to respond to sin and react to those who sin in much the same way as the religious establishment of Jesus' day. There was a stark difference in how Jesus talked about sin, spoke about sin, and responded to those who sinned compared to that of the religious establishment. In this message we learned that what we think of when we think of sin and how we feel when hear about or see sin is very important and very telling.

Why is it so important? How we think about sin shapes how we think about people who sin, and how we think about people who sin shapes how we treat people who sin.

## DISCUSSION:

- 1. Why is it that the list of churches' favorite sins to preach against seems to change every few years? What were some of the one you remember throughout your lifetime?
- 2. In the message today it was said, "How we think about sin shapes how we think about people who sin, and how we think about people who sin shapes how we treat people who sin." Why is this important to understand as it relates to engaging in a world where many live with an opposing value system than Christ followers?
- 3. When you think of religious establishment in the 21st century, who comes to mind?
- 4. In Matthew 15, we read of how the religious elite had created their own system of doing things that in many ways allowed them to ignore God's clear commands. What type of loopholes have you used or heard of someone using to allow themselves to sidestep God's clear instruction on a particular matter?
- 5. What was so important about Jesus elevating sin from just a matter of action to a matter of attitude and nature of the heart? Why is it easier to fixate on individual expressions of sin than it is to think of sin as originating in the heart and expressing itself in many different ways?
- 6. Jesus spoke of sin as being a master that enslaves, a bully that harasses, a blindness, and a terminal illness that infected those in need of a doctor. How does this perspective change the way we think about sin, talk about sin, and respond to those who sin?
- 7. Why do you think people usually gravitate towards judging sinners rather than offering rescue? In the past, what has lead you to be judgmental rather than empathetic?
- 8. How was Jesus able to lead people away from sin and rescue them without making them feel judged?
- 9. How was it that Jesus cared more about the person being victimized by sin than he did his own reputation in the eyes of the religious leaders of his day? What might that mean for us?

## APPLICATION:

Pay attention to how you talk about, think about, and respond to other people's sin. Try to create ways to intentionally begin to look at sin and respond to sin like Jesus.
